## SCOUT ANNIVERSARY DAY - SCOUT SUNDAY, FEB 8<sup>TH</sup>

Chartered organizations can celebrate Scout Sunday on any day in February that best serves the chartering partner. Some organizations choose the Sunday that falls before February 8 (Scouting Anniversary Day) as the date to recognize the contributions of young people and adults to Scouting. This year, Scout Anniversary Day falls on Sunday, Feb 8th. For others, Scout Sunday is celebrated on the second Sunday in February. It is permissible for a local church to celebrate on the day most acceptable to the pastor and congregation.

Ideas - wear your uniforms and sit together, serve as ushers, lead a prayer and serve as a liturgist, set up a Scouting display in the foyer, ask members of the congregation who were Scouts to stand up, hold your troop's Court of Honor or Pack's award ceremony immediately following the service, or formally present your unit's charter to your place of worship. These activities not only honor the faith of Scouts but also provide an opportunity for community engagement and service.



## MLK NATIONAL DAY OF SERVICE, JAN 19TH

Join Scouts across the country as they participate in the Martin Luther King Jr. National Day of Service. This day invites every American to step forward and strengthen their communities through meaningful volunteer work, and Scouts will be ready to lead by example.



## CAMP CORNHUSKER HISTORY

By March of 1956, the Council hired Kuper Construction of Humboldt to build many of the buildings that would be needed at the Camp. Volunteers worked alongside the company and by the opening day of summer camp they had already put in most of the roads, planted grass on the road shoulders, laid water lines and constructed the rifle range. The "new" Scout Reservation began its life as an official Boy Scout Camp on June 10, 1956. There were 622 scouts that attended the Reservation during that first summer. After a successful summer camp, the camp was dedicated on Oct 28, 1956, the last day of a Council-wide Camporee held at the camp.



A Humboldt native and owner of Kuper Construction, Vern Kuper was a Chief Radioman in the U.S. Navy during World War II and earned the Silver Star and two Bronze Stars for his service through eight campaigns in both the Atlantic and Pacific.

## PROTECT AGAINST AI AND DEEPFAKES

Artificial Intelligence (AI) technology is rapidly evolving – and with it, there are new threats to online safety. For example, online predators use generative AI (GAI) to create morphed or fake child sexual abuse material (CSAM) and then sometimes engage in blackmail schemes targeting kids. This technology is also being used by kids and teens to target their peers. GAI child sexual abuse imagery is still CSAM. It is illegal, emotionally, and psychologically harmful and deeply traumatic. Understanding this evolving threat is the first step in protecting kids and teens.

**NEW GAI TECHNOLOGIES AND ASSOCIATED RISKS.** Understanding the latest technologies and their associated risks is crucial to prevent, protect and empower victims and survivors. AI technology allows a user to create new images, videos, audio and text based on user requests or prompts. This could include any visual depiction, such as computer-generated images, that appear to depict a minor engaging in sexually explicit conduct. Deepfake technology uses AI to create realistic images or videos of people doing or saying things they never did. The term “deepfake” combines “deep learning” – a type of AI used to generate the content – and “fake.” Nudifying Services allow an individual to upload an innocent clothed image of a person to create a virtual depiction of that person unclothed. Reports show these services are promoted as tools on nudifying websites and forums – sometimes even disguised as “pedophile guides” – that coach predators on how to exploit children using AI. Online predators use nudifying services to upload a fully clothed image of a child or teen and use AI to generate a fake, sexualized version of that image. These fake images are then used for blackmail or other forms of exploitation.

### HOW TO AVOID GAI CSAM

- Ensure your and your child's profiles are set to private and that all images are for friends-only and not publicly accessible.
- Use parental control settings. View Connect2Protect: Parental Controls for more information.
- Maintain open lines of communication with children about their online activities.
- Encourage them to come to you with any concerns or questions they may have about AI, deepfakes and online safety.

### HOW TO RESPOND

 Take immediate action if you know or suspect a child or teen in your care is a victim of online CSEA.

- Remain calm.
- Consider putting the device in airplane mode and ensure Bluetooth and Wi-Fi are turned off so evidence cannot be remotely erased, deleted or altered by the offender.
- Save all communication – do not delete.
- Contact law enforcement and ensure they can access the device.
- Do not send images from your child's device to any other device. It is illegal to disseminate CSAM.
- Report the incident to law enforcement.

### HOW TO REPORT

 You can submit a report in one of the following ways:

- Call the Department of Homeland Security's Know2Protect Tipline at 833-591-KNOW (5669). All information received via the Tipline will be reviewed by appropriate personnel and referred to Homeland Security Investigations field offices for potential investigation.
- Contact your local, state or tribal law enforcement officials directly. In an emergency, call 911.
- Submit a CyberTipline report with the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children at [report.cybertip.org](http://report.cybertip.org).

Are you an adult or youth in scouting that trains other adults or youth? Whether or not you hold a formal position in your unit, if you are involved in Scouting America, then most likely at some point you have and will help with training. "Fundamentals of Training" will be held on Jan 17<sup>th</sup> from 8:30am to 4pm at Grace Lutheran Church, 22<sup>nd</sup> and Washington Street, in Lincoln.



If you are a Den Leader, you are training the Cub Scouts in your Den. If you are a Senior Patrol Leader, you are training Scouts in your Troop in skills and leadership. If you are a Merit Badge Counselor, you are training scouts in the skills you are presenting. This is why all adults, and youth over the age of 14, are encouraged to complete Scouting America's Fundamentals of Training courses.

Fundamentals Part 1 - Science of Training is designed to help Scouts and Scouters, regardless of their training experience, identify effective training methods. It will help freshen up the skills of current Scouting America trainers, as well. The skills and strategies presented have been shown to improve teaching and learning. The value of these skills are not limited to a role in Scouting but can be applied in personal and professional settings as well.

Fundamentals Part 2- Craft of Training is the second part of the train-the-trainer continuum. As trainers develop their training skills, this course provides an opportunity for trainers to practice and refine their abilities through experiential learning, paired with feedback from faculty members and peers.

## NRA SHOTGUN BASIC TRAINING, FEB 28<sup>TH</sup> - MAR 1<sup>ST</sup>

This training is the first step in becoming a certified instructor/MB counselor for rifle, shotgun and pistol safety courses. This is the NRA Basic Shotgun course and teaches the basic knowledge, skills, and attitude for the safe and proper use of a shotgun in shooting a moving target. This course is at least 10 hours long and includes classroom and range time learning how to shoot shotguns at moving targets.



Cost of this standalone course is \$90.00

You will need to bring a sack lunch, pen and paper. Any personal firearms that are brought will be inspected by the instructors. DO NOT bring ammunition.

MUST have a minimum of 4 registrants to hold course.



BALOO and IOLS aren't just training courses, they are your all-access pass to unforgettable outdoor adventures. These hands-on programs are designed to build your skills and confidence, ensuring you can lead your unit safely in the outdoors.



### Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation (BALOO)

For Cub Scout leaders ready to take their pack on an overnight camping trip, BALOO is an essential, hands-on training that includes an overnight campout.

What you'll get out of it:

- Gain confidence: If you're a new leader or have limited outdoor experience, BALOO will equip you with the knowledge to make your pack's first campout a safe and comfortable experience.
- Create core memories: Learn how to plan and lead successful, age-appropriate overnight adventures that Cub Scouts and their families will remember for a lifetime.
- Master the essentials: Go beyond the basics to master campsite selection, safe cooking techniques, and campfire programs that will spark every Scout's imagination.
- Get connected: Collaborate and share ideas with other leaders, building a network that will support your journey long after the course is over.

### Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills (IOLS)

For Scouts BSA, Venturing, and Sea Scouting leaders, IOLS is a critical training course that unlocks the secrets of delivering a top-tier outdoor program.

## OUTDOOR ADVENTURES TRAINING, MAR 21-22

Already completed the Council's Outdoor Preparedness and want to know more about putting on a successful and engaging outdoor program for the Scouts in your unit?

The Council's Outdoor Adventures program takes your learning to the next level by enabling you to understand some basic aspects of adventure planning, advanced camping, and next-level programming. This course is taught by scouts that have experience with all of Scouting America's high adventure bases and with planning their own high adventure trips within their unit.

During the course we cover various topics building on the skills and knowledge learned in the Outdoor Preparedness program. ## WOODBADGE 2026! APR 10-12 AND APR 25-26, 2026

*Welcome to Cornhusker Council Wood Badge Course 5-324-26-1!*

Wood Badge is the premier adult training in Scouting America. In Wood Badge you experience the scouting program, learn leadership skills, and practice teamwork in the patrol method, all while living the values of scouting.

Created by Lord Baden-Powell at Gilwell Park in England, today Wood Badge is offered around the world. Across the two weekends of Wood Badge, you begin your experience as a Cub Scout and cross over to a Scouts BSA Troop, gaining the perspective of a youth and deepening your understanding of the Scouting America program. While portions of the course take place camping, the focus is not outdoor skills and scoutcraft, but rather on leadership and team building. You learn both the theory of leadership and the tools of leadership in ways that not only strengthen your contribution to scouting, but also to your personal and professional life. Don't be surprised if you find yourself applying lessons learned in Wood Badge to improve the communication and team effectiveness in your day-job as well!

### Objectives of Wood Badge

- Enable you to view Scouting globally, as a family of interrelated, values-based programs that provide age-appropriate activities.
- Help you recognize contemporary leadership concepts that map to the scouting movement.
- Apply the skills learned as a member of a successful working team, both in and out of scouting. Revitalize your commitment to and recharge your enthusiasm for Scouting by participating in a shared, inspirational experience.

### Practical Phase

The practical phase consists of five days of instruction across two weekends. During these two weekends you will become a member of a group, participate in presentations, learn skills, become an effective team, and have a great time doing it. The course is accessible to adults across the full range of ages, experience, and abilities. The following themes are covered in the practical phase:

- Living the Values—personifying the values; setting the example
- Growing—knowing and growing yourself first with a commitment to continuous improvement and lifelong learning
- Connecting—with other people
- Guiding—focusing on enabling and developing others
- Empowering—ultimately helping other people to become healthier, wiser, freer, more autonomous, and more likely, themselves, “to serve and to lead.”

Example session topics include vision, values, listening, managing conversations, leading change, the stages of team development, coaching & mentoring, servant leadership, and project planning.

### Application Phase

After completion of the two weekends, you will work on your “ticket”, which are five goals you develop for yourself during the course. You have 18 months to complete your ticket, during which you put into practice the leadership skills you have just learned. Upon completion of the Wood Badge ticket, as



certified by a ticket counselor and the Scout Executive, you will be presented with the Wood Badge neckerchief, woggle, and beads.

### Participation Requirements

- Registered as an adult member of Scouting America, including current Safeguarding Youth Training
- Scouting America's Annual Health and Medical Record parts A, B, and C (which requires a physical)
- A complete official Scouting America uniform appropriate to Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, or Venturing consisting of all of the following parts
  - uniform shirt
  - uniform pants, shorts, or skirt
  - uniform belt
  - uniform socks

## WORLD SCOUT JAMBOREE, JULY 30-AUG 8, 2027, GDANSK, POLAND

Registration is now open for the 2027 World Jamboree! The World Scout Jamboree is held every four years at locations all around the world. The next World Jamboree will be held in Gdansk, Poland in the summer of 2027 and will have approximately 45,000 Scouts and leaders from over 140 countries in attendance. Anyone younger than that will have to wait for the 2031 Jamboree in Denmark.

## EARN YOUR RECRUITER STRIP! IT'S FREE!

The Arrow of Light badge of rank marks a major milestone in a Cub Scout's growth. The senior patrol leader badge represents one of the most important positions of responsibility in a Scouts BSA troop. And the Eagle Scout award symbolizes an incredible journey of perseverance.



But when considering the array of Scouting awards and recognitions available to young people, you can make the argument that one of them stands above all the others.

If you think about its ability to grow Scouting and introduce this life-changing program to new people, the Recruiter Strip might be the most important patch in Scouting.

It's also one of the easiest to earn.

### How to earn the Recruiter Strip

The Recruiter Strip has just one requirement: recruit a friend into Scouting.

Any youth member – in Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing or Sea Scouts – who gets a friend, classmate or relative to sign up for Scouting can receive the red, white and blue patch.

Each Scout unit comes up with its own procedure for awarding the strip. In most packs, troops, crews and ships, the young person receives the strip the first time he or she successfully recruits someone into the unit.

## REMINDER - UPDATE YOUR “PIN!”

Unit and District Leadership - please continue efforts to keep your Unit's “pin” updated in [beascout.scouting.org](http://beascout.scouting.org). The ongoing National Marketing Campaign uses this website exclusively to link up potential new members (“leads”) with local units. Nationally, 50% of all leads go unanswered! Our Council does not have that problem, but we need to maintain our current level of excellence by keeping our information on this site updated. **Unit leaders, be sure to follow up on ALL leads!**

## FAMILY TROOP OPTION APPROVED

The National Executive Board approved the “Family Troop” option for Scouts BSA, following a successful pilot.

This option provides chartered organizations with more flexibility in delivering Scouting to families in communities where there are not enough youth to have a boy-only or girl-only troop. While the vast majority of troops will continue to specifically serve boys or girls in the years ahead, this option gives chartered organizations the ability to meet the unique needs of their communities and families who want to do Scouting together in a unit. There are several things to consider before deciding on whether to become a “Family Troop.” In any situation, the decision should involve all stakeholders:

- **Chartered Organization – The chartered organization(s) MUST be a part of the discussion and MUST approve the decision to change the model.**
- **Adult Volunteers – All Scouts BSA troops depend upon our adult volunteers to operate successfully. Adult volunteers, including the Scoutmaster(s), committee chair(s), and committee members, should broadly support a change.**
- **Parents – The parents of the Scouts also should broadly support a change.**
- **Scouts – Scouts BSA is youth-led, and the Scouts should also be a part of the decision-making process.**

## HOW IS YOUR TROOP DOING?

Scouts BSA has an online self-assessment tool for troops. Previously, this was a PDF form, but it is now available in an online format. The program is not a patch or recognition initiative but a resource to help leaders identify their unit's strengths and challenges, providing real-time resources and relevant information to address concerns. ## NEW UNIFIED SCOUTS BSA HANDBOOK

Based on significant feedback from youth and volunteers, Scouting America has announced the release of a unified Scouts BSA Handbook designed for all youth who are part of the Scouts BSA program. This handbook does not replace the current 14th Edition of the Scouts BSA Handbook, and this unified version has no major program changes. It is simply a single, unified version of the handbook that can be used by boys or girls in Scouts BSA. The text remains the same, but photos now reflect all youth in Scouts BSA. Leaders, youth, and units spoke about their desire for this unified version, and we listened. The handbook will be available for purchase at Scout Shops nationwide in January 2026.

## GROW THE UNIT, GROW THE MOVEMENT

***Thank you,*** for your continued efforts thus far to grow the Scouting movement in southeast Nebraska! Our membership goal is to serve 2,500 youth by December 31<sup>st</sup>. A few suggestions to build and keep the flow of scouts into your unit:

- \* **Continue to invite prospective Scouts to troop activities.** Look for "Normal Friend Activities" - "Bring a Friend" events in your Unit's program. You never know what event will peak someone's interest.
- \* **Update your online presence.** Make sure your contact info, meeting time, and location are current on your unit pin. Keep unit websites and social media pages up to date. Keep up with your invitation manager in my.scouting. Contact prospective recruits in a timely manner.
- \* **Engage the parents as well as the Scouts.** We're recruiting them, too. Make sure you have a 'welcoming committee' for new parents who visit your Unit.
- \* **Work together!** If your unit isn't the right fit for your recruit, invite them to visit a neighboring unit. Everyone's contact info is on [beascout.org](#).
- \* **Be a presence in your neighborhood.** If no one knows you're around, they can't join you.
- \* **Always be recruiting.** Potential new Scouts are everywhere.

### \* STEPS FOR UNIT RENEWALS

1. Unit Key 3 Member Log on to my.Scouting.org, navigate to Organization Manager>Unit Renewal.
2. Validate Information.
3. Check your leadership positions and make sure you have the correct names in the correct positions.
  - a. The Chartered Organization Representative or delegate can use "Position Manager" also found in Organization Manager to edit and then wait overnight for the data jobs to run, then you can revalidate.
4. E-Sign the Page.
5. Unit Pin Review.
6. Continue to Unit Renewal.
7. Select payment method.
  - a. Pay online by Credit Card or ACH.
  - b. Follow prompts to use a saved credit card or add a new one.
  - c. Follow prompts to print summary sheet and pay at council.
8. The annual charter agreement is mandatory and must be obtained outside of the electronic process.  
After completing the updated charter agreement, please file it in the unit's records at the council office. The unit renewal process is now complete- no further action is needed.

### \* STEPS FOR UNIT RENEWING THEIR MEMBERS

1. Unit Key 3 Member Log on to my.Scouting.org, navigate to Organization Manager>Roster.
2. Select the members you want to renew.
3. Create renewal orders. Review/select the positions to renew for each person. Create renewal orders.
4. Select payment method: Pay online by Credit Card or ACH. Follow prompts to use a saved credit card or add a new one.

### \* STEPS FOR PARENT RENEWING THEIR YOUTH'S MEMBERSHIP

1. Log on to my.Scouting.org.
  - a. If the parent/guardian does not have a my.Scouting account, an account must be created in the parent/guardian name. Visit <https://my.scouting.org/> to create an account. You will need the scout's member ID number to link to the parent/guardian account. The member ID number can be provided by the Unit leader, Committee chairperson or unit membership chair (or from the membership renewal emails you should have already received).  
I .Only the parent/guardian that is linked to the scout will be able to renew them when it is time for the annual renewal.
2. Click on the notification icon (should have a "red" notification symbol).
  - a. You can only renew one youth member at a time.
  - b. Follow prompts through renewal process and e-sign for renewal.
3. Select payment option.
  - a. Pay online - Follow prompts to pay by credit card. You have now completed the process for this youth member.
  - b. Pay at the office - Follow the prompts to print the document and submit it with payment to the local council office.
4. Repeat the process for each youth family member.

### \* STEPS FOR ADULTS RENEWING THEIR MEMBERSHIP

1. Log on to my.Scouting.org.
  - a. If you've never logged on before you will need your member ID number and create a login username and password. You can get the member ID number from your unit leader, committee chairperson, unit membership chair (or from the membership renewal emails you should have already received).
2. Click on the notification icon (should have a "red" notification symbol). Follow prompts to e-sign for renewal.
3. Select payment option Pay online - follow prompts to pay by credit card. You have now completed the process.







## SCOUT EXECUTIVE MINUTE

### Staying True to Scouting America's Apolitical Mission

Scouting has thrived for more than a century because families from every background trust that our movement is about youth—never politics. Our Rules and Regulations are clear: 'The Boy Scouts of America must not... involve Scouting in political matters.' That applies to national, councils, units, volunteers, and youth—at meetings, activities, online, and in the wider community.



To preserve that trust—especially in today's highly charged political environment—we are asking every unit to recommit to the following:

1. No political activity in uniform or under the Scouting brand. Do not attend or participate in rallies, marches, fundraisers, or public events that carry political messages while in uniform or using the Scouting name, marks, or channels.
2. Uniform integrity. Keep the official uniform exactly as specified; no additions or alterations that signal political viewpoints or causes.
3. Brand stewardship. Councils and units must use approved marks only and must not combine Scouting branding with political imagery or themes.
4. A Scout is Courteous. We welcome every family committed to the Scout Oath and Law. We prohibit bullying, harassment, and unlawful discrimination—online and in person—and we expect leaders to ensure a respectful environment for all youth.

Personal civic engagement is important and your right—but do it as a private individual, off-duty, out of uniform, and without Scouting marks. When we keep Scouting apolitical, we protect our mission and the trust that families place in us. Thank you for your leadership.
