As of the most recent report, nationwide, there are more than 15,820 open leads (a 0.2% increase over last week) and more than 2,320 pending applications (a 10% decrease) awaiting follow-up in the online registration system. Each lead represents a family interested in learning more about Scouting, and each pending



application is an excited new youth member who has already paid to join and is just waiting for unit approval.

Now is a great time to check in with your council partners. Make sure you know how your council handles pending applications and leads from BeAScout.org. These should get a response within 24 hours.

It is important to follow the plan and make sure someone is in charge.

Pending applications need quick action. Someone has decided to join, filled out an application, and paid the money. Accept them right away.

Leads also need a quick response and follow-up. Once you have a plan, move the lead off BeAScout and into a tracking tool like a spreadsheet.

We expect thousands of applications and leads from BeAScout.org. Let's welcome each person quickly and warmly!

SAFE GUARDING YOUTH TRAINING FOR PARENTS


Safeguarding youth is our highest priority. As part of our continued commitment to creating a safe and supportive environment for every young person in our programs, we are excited to announce the launch of the new Safeguarding Youth Training (SYT) video for the parents in the Scouting Movement. SEPTEMBER WAS SUICIDE PREVENTION MONTH - A YEAR-LONG COMMITMENT

Suicide looms as a growing problem for youth and their families. Depression, suicidal thoughts, and suicide can be sensitive and difficult topics to speak about openly, but studies show acknowledging and talking about suicide may reduce suicidal ideation. Help is available in many forms for those struggling with mental health. This guide has been prepared to help leaders facilitate a suicide prevention session at a troop meeting and can be found here: <u>Suicide Prevention Discussion Guide FINAL.pdf</u>

MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID, OCT 25

Mental Health First Aid is an international evidence-based education program proven to be effective in teaching adults how to recognize and respond to signs and symptoms of mental health and substance use challenges. Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA) is designed to teach parents, family members, caregivers, teachers, school staff, peers, neighbors, health and human services



Youth Mental Health First Aid is primarily designed for adults who regularly interact with young people. The course introduces common mental health challenges for youth, reviews typical adolescent development, and teaches a 5-step action plan for how to help young people in both crisis and non-crisis situations. Topics covered include anxiety, depression, substance use, disorders in which psychosis may occur, disruptive behavior disorders (including ADHD), and eating disorders.

Instructor Bio: Kristi Lange is a licensed clinical social worker, licensed mental health practitioner, and a provisionally licensed alcohol and drug counselor. She has been working within the mental health field for more than 10 years. She currently serves as a social worker on the LPS Threat Assessment Team. Kristi also serves on the HopeLNK Suicide Prevention Coalition. She has been teaching Youth Mental Health First Aid courses for the last 4 years.

JOTI/JOTA, OCT 17-19 2025

Jamboree-on-the-Internet, or JOTI, is an annual international Scouting event sponsored by the World Organization of the Scout Movement. Each year, during the third weekend in October, Scouts from around the world gather online to learn about other cultures and the activities in which other Scouts participate. They communicate with each other using Internet-enabled devices such as computers, laptops, tablets, and mobile phones. Each year, JOTI has nearly 16,000 Scouts and leaders from over 145 countries registered in the worldwide JOTA-JOTI database! Who Can Participate? Scouts of any age can take part, from Cub Scouts to



JOTA-JOTI is back on October 17-19, 2025. Mark your calendars!

Scouts BSA and Venturers. Scouts can participate at home with the help of an adult, or they can participate in a Scout group at a council event. JOTI is an economical way to participate in an international jamboree. The event allows Scouts to "meet" other Scouts from around the world through the Internet and share more information than just "Hi." The exchanges can include such information as name, location of event, Scout rank, age, and hobbies. Some exchanges lead to long-lasting friendships. JOTI participation fulfills requirements for Tiger and Arrow of Light adventures, the Citizenship in the World merit badge, and the International Spirit Award. Jamboree-on-the-Air, or JOTA, is the largest Scouting event in the world. It is held annually during the third full weekend in October. JOTA uses amateur radio to link Scouts and Radio operators around the world, around the nation, and in your own community. This jamboree requires no travel, other than

to a nearby amateur radio operator's ham shack. It's a great way to get more youth interested in amateur radio while demonstrating the fun as well as the service aspects via emergency communication of amateur radio. The scope of your JOTA activities is only limited by your imagination Tell Me More Scouts of any age can participate: from Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA and Venturers, up to BSA Adult Leaders. Any amateur mode of operation can be used such, as CW, SSB, PSK, SSTV, FM, and satellite. The more modes in operation, the more exciting the event will be for the Scouts. JOTA is not a contest. The idea is to contact other Scout stations and allow as many Scouts as possible to talk to other Scouts and learn about who they are and what they are doing. The exchanges include such information as name, location (called QTH in ham speak), Scout rank, age, and hobbies. The stations you'll be communicating with can be across town, across the country, or even around the world! The World Scout Bureau reported that nearly over 1 million Scouts and around 20,000 amateur radio operators participate in JOTA annually, from more than 17,000 stations in over 150 countries. Welcome to Cornhusker Council Wood Badge! Registration is now open!

Wood Badge is an adult training where you work with others to learn and practice leadership skills (as a member of a successful working team) and live the values of scouting.

This course will help you understand the full values-based family of Scouting programs as well as discover ways to use the leadership skills to improve your personal and professional life.

Wood Badge gives leaders the skills they need to strengthen Scouting in meaningful ways and deliver a quality program to our youth.

Skills Useful Outside of Scouting

You will be able to use these lessons and experiences from Wood Badge outside of scouting to make every team a successful team, whether the team is at your work or is your family. Inspired in England by Lord Baden-Powell at Gilwell Camp, Wood Badge is today offered around the world. Upon completion, a Scouter receives a certificate, neckerchief, woggle, and beads, and becomes a permanent member of Troop 1, Gilwell.

Woodbadge Course Description

Wood Badge is advanced leadership training for adult leaders in all of Boy Scouting's program areas - Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting, Varsity Scouting, and Venturing - as well Council and District leaders. It teaches skills that are useful in Scouting, work, family, and other community service activities. The focus is on leadership and team-building, not outdoor skills.

Objectives of Wood Badge

To enable you to view Scouting globally, as a family of interrelated, values-based programs that provide age-appropriate activities

To help you recognize contemporary leadership concepts that applies to our values-based movement.

To apply the skills learned as a member of a successful working team.

To revitalize your commitment to Scouting by sharing in an overall inspirational experience.

Course Organization

The Wood Badge experience is divided into two parts - a practical phase and an application phase.

Practical Phase

The practical phase consists of Five days of instruction.

During this time you will become a member of a group, share skills and knowledge, become an effective team and have a great experience while doing it.

Themes covered in the practical phase include:

Living the Values (developing your personal mission and vision)

- Bringing the Vision to Life (communication skills, coaching and mentoring, leveraging diversity)
- Models for Success (how your style of leadership should relate to the skills of your team)
- Tools of the Trade (project planning, managing conflict, assessing team performance, managing change, celebrating team success)
- Leading to Make a Difference (leaving a legacy and secrets of leadership)

With the help of a staffer, you will be able to develop a "ticket" by the end of the practical phase of the course. This is a set of 5 personal goals designed to significantly strengthen the program in which you are involved. The ticket provides a structure for the practice of the new skills you will learn.

Application Phase

The application phase is also known as "working your ticket". You will have 18 months to complete your ticket, which will allow you to become proficient in the leadership and team-building skills you have just learned. Upon completion of the Wood Badge ticket, as certified by a ticket counselor and the Scout Executive, you will be presented with the Wood Badge certificate, neckerchief, woggle, and beads at an appropriate public ceremony.

UNIFORM: A full, official uniform is required and consists of: official BSA uniform shirt; official BSA uniform pants, shorts or skirts- skirts or shorts are worn, official BSA socks are required; and official BSA web belt.



Historical Background:

The United States will mark its Semiquincentennial in 2026, celebrating 250 years since the signing of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. Nebraska, while not one of the original thirteen colonies, played a critical role in the westward expansion of the U.S. and the shaping of the nation. From the Louisiana Purchase and the passage of the Homestead Act, to the legacy of leaders like Chief Standing Bear, Nebraska holds a unique place in America's journey toward liberty and justice for all.



To honor this milestone, this patch program combines historical learning with civic engagement, outdoor exploration, and service—true to the spirit of Scouting.

Timeframe - All requirements must be completed and submitted by December 31, 2026.

ANOTHER OPPORTUNITY TO MEET THE "VISIT A HISTORIC NEBRASKA SITE" REQUIREMENT:

In 1973, Nebraska's "500 Mile Sculpture Garden" project was a new proposal to the Nebraska American Revolution Bicentennial Commission. Thomas A. Yates, previously of Bankers Life Nebraska, and Norman Geske, former Sheldon Museum of Art Director were responsible for the idea that forged new ground and the project built excitement throughout the state. The project was accepted and executed with the cooperation of the chambers of commerce for the communities involved, the University of Nebraska -Lincoln, Sheldon Museum of Art, the Federal Highway Administration, and several state agencies. The purpose of the project was to celebrate the Nation's bicentennial by providing access to examples of the best contemporary sculpture of the time outside museum walls and contribute to Nebraska's cultural heritage.

<u>Added requirement option</u>: visit one of the three of the sculptures that reside in the Cornhusker Council:

- 1. "Crossing the Plains," located at the York Rest Area Westbound I-80.
- 2. "Arrival," located at the Blue River Rest Area, Eastbound I-80 near Seward.
- 3. "Memorial to the American Bandshell," located at the Platte River Rest Area, Eastbound I-80, near Ashland.

SAFEGUARDING YOUTH REFERENCE CARD

The "Scouting America Safeguarding Youth Pocket Guide" is available! The pocket guides were handed out at all three September Roundtables. If you didn't get yours, they will be available at October's Roundtable and at the Scout Office. Keep this handy reference guide in your unit gear, Troop trailer, etc. for easy access. Every Scout leader is responsible for keeping youth safe—and the 'Scouting America Safeguarding Youth Pocket Guide" puts the most critical Safeguarding Youth Protection policies in your hands, right when you need them.





ADULT LEADER TRAINING AWARDS

Scouting America's mission of building character and developing leaders in young people simply would not be possible without the dedication of its adult volunteers. These



individuals are the backbone of the program, dedicating countless hours to mentoring, teaching, and serving. To recognize this immense commitment, Scouting America offers a number of adult awards and recognition.

Most Scouting America adult awards are presented with a distinctive square knot patch that is worn on the adult uniform, centered above the left pocket. Each knot's unique color combination represents a different award. The adult training awards celebrate leaders who complete required training and fulfill tenure requirements for their specific roles. When a leader completes these requirements, they earn a distinctive square knot patch to wear on their uniform.

Leaders sometimes struggle to see the importance of earning these awards themselves. Earning and displaying your adult training awards on your uniform as a Scoutmaster, Den Leader or other position in Scouting America can signal to potential Scouts and their parents that your unit may be a good choice. Those awards are a visible sign of a commitment to a well-run, safe, and quality program in your unit.

Here are some of the knots earned for training and position-specific excellence:

- <u>Den Leader Training Award</u>: Recognizes leaders of Lion, Tiger, Wolf, Bear, or Webelos dens who completes their position-specific training, have a year of tenure, and meets the designated performance standards.
- Scouter's Training Award: Earned by any registered adult who completes
 their position-specific training, has two years of tenure, and meets the
 designated performance standards.
- <u>Scouter's Keys</u>: These "Keys" are awarded to the unit's primary leader (Cubmaster, Scoutmaster, Venturing Advisor, or Sea Skipper) for completing training and a minimum of three years of outstanding service and performance in their role.







These knots serve as a silent testament to a volunteer's accomplishments and dedication, making their uniform a chronicle of service and leadership. If you meet the requirements for an award we would encourage you to submit an application and be recognized for your service to your unit and Scouting America.

The completed application forms can be emailed or dropped off at the Council office or emailed to your Council Training Chair. The next time you see a leader with a knot on their uniform, take a moment to acknowledge their dedication. It's a visible sign of the profound impact they've made on the lives of young people through Scouting.
