How can we HELP our units in February?



The Council Registrar, Manuela, recently emailed the following “Mid Year Unit Check Up” to all units. Please review and verify unit leaders have completed these steps to ensure a smooth unit renewal process!

- Check your roster attachment.
- Identify youth & adults that are expired or about to expire. If so, renew the Scouts online or call us with payment and I can renew if the Scout or adult is still listed. Are you missing any youth that may have dropped or didn't get registered? If they are participating in your program, they **MUST BE REGISTERED!!!**
- Compare your attached roster to your Scoutbook account. These should match! If you have Scouts in Scoutbook that do not show on this roster, they need to be registered!
- Check your adults Safeguarding Youth Training (SYT) dates. Remind your adults to take the new Safeguarding Youth Training by May 31st. **Everyone has to take the new training by the end of May. This is important for our summer unit renewals.** (This holds up the unit renewal most often!).
- Do you have adults registered in dual positions within your unit? Example: Committee Member and Committee Chair? You would need 2 separate people.
- Are all your unit adult positions filled? Example: IH, COR, CC, CM x2, Scoutmaster or Cubmaster, DL
- Are your adults trained in all their positions, can you say that your unit is 100% trained? This matters for your yearly health assessment and FOS Goals.
- *The Council can reset your MyScouting password!*

Family Troops

The National Executive Board for Scouting America approved the implementation of the combined troop option. The “Family Troop” option is now available to all chartering organizations as a third option as of December 15th, 2025. Troops will continue to be able to organize as boy troops and girl troops.

If any troop is interested in the combined troop option, the unit leadership must contact their district executive to begin the paperwork process. A team of commissioners is developing a “Best Practices for Combined Troops” that will be available after the team completes their interviews with troops that participated in the pilot.

Merit Badge Updates

Effective January 1, 2026, over 80 merit badges have updates ranging from minor clarifications to substantial content changes. Some badges have new requirements added, while others have been reorganized or updated to reflect current practices and knowledge.

Updated Career Exploration Requirements

Many merit badges now feature expanded career exploration options that help Scouts research real-world job opportunities, understand education requirements, and explore how Scouting skills connect to future careers or hobbies. These updated requirements encourage Scouts to think about how their interests might shape their future.

Enhanced Safety and Outdoor Ethics

Several badges now include important discussions about Leave No Trace principles and the Outdoor Code, helping Scouts understand their responsibility to protect natural areas during their adventures.

Modernized Content and Skills

Merit badges have been updated to reflect current technology, safety practices, and knowledge.

Safety Moment: Hypothermia



Signs/Symptoms of Hypothermia

- Feeling cold, shivering uncontrollably
- Cool or cold skin on the abdomen, chest, or back
- Presence of the "umbles"
 - * Stumbles: loss of control over movement
 - * Mumbles: slurred or incoherent speech
 - * Fumbles: poor coordination or reaction time
 - * Grumbles: change in behavior or attitude

Care of Hypothermia

- Get the victim out of the cold.
- Remove wet clothing and wrap them up in warm, dry clothes. Add additional layers such as a sleeping bag, blankets, or some form of plastic to hold in body heat.
- If the victim is conscious and able to swallow, offer warm liquids to drink. **Do not** give alcoholic drinks.
- Apply warm, dry compresses to the neck, chest, and groin areas. **Do not** apply heat to the arms or legs, because this speeds cold blood back to the heart, lungs, and brain, causing the core temperature to drop even lower; this can be fatal.
- **Do not** apply direct heat as with hot water bottles, a heating pad, or a heating lamp. This extreme heat can cause skin damage, an irregular heart rhythm, or even cardiac arrest.
- If a person with severe hypothermia who is unconscious seems to not have a pulse or not be breathing, perform CPR. CPR should continue during rewarming. Sometimes, people experiencing hypothermia can be successfully resuscitated.
- Get emergency care/call 911.
