
OUTDOOR PREPAREDNESS & OUTDOOR ADVENTURE TRAINING, AUG 22-24

SAFEGUARDING FROM HIDDEN CAMERAS

In an increasingly connected world, the convenience of technology sometimes comes with the unsettling reality of privacy invasion. Hidden cameras, once the domain of spy thrillers, are now miniaturized, affordable, and unfortunately, accessible to those with malicious intent. From hotels and rental properties to public restrooms and changing rooms, the possibility of being unknowingly recorded is a growing concern.

But don't panic. There are proactive steps you can take to reduce the risk to your safety and security.

The Tell-Tale Signs: What to Look For

It's a good idea to familiarize yourself with common hiding spots and visual cues:

- Air Vents & Air Fresheners: These offer excellent camouflage for miniature lenses.
- Smoke Detectors/Alarms: These are classic hiding places. Check for anything that seems out of place, like a tiny lens, a small hole, or a power cord.
- Clocks & Digital Devices: Many modern hidden cameras are disguised as everyday electronics. Scrutinize charging ports, LED lights, and any unusual wiring.
- Lighting Fixtures: Carefully examine the light fixtures. Does any part of it seem unusual? Is there a small hole, a tiny lens, or a suspicious bulge that doesn't belong?
- Power Outlets & USB Chargers: Tiny cameras can be embedded in these, often with a small pinhole lens.
- Mirrors & Wall Decor: Be suspicious of two-way mirrors. Look for anything that seems slightly off-kilter or has a suspicious bulge.
- Urinals and Toilets: Hidden cameras often require only a tiny aperture. Look for power cables or anything that seems out of place.

Your Defensive Toolkit: Practical Strategies

Now that you know what to look for, here's how to actively search for hidden cameras:

The Visual Sweep: A Thorough Inspection

- Start with the Obvious: First, take time to methodically scan the room, paying close attention to the common hiding spots listed above.
- Get Down Low and Up High: Don't just scan at eye level. Get on your hands and knees to check under furniture and look up at ceilings and light fixtures.
- Focus on Private Areas: Prioritize bathrooms, bedrooms, and changing areas.

The Flashlight Test: Unmasking the Lens

 Turn off the lights and use your phone's camera: Many hidden cameras use infrared (IR) for night vision. Your smartphone camera can often detect these glowing IR lights, which are invisible to the naked eye.

Most hidden cameras have a lens that will reflect light. Turn off the lights in the room and use your phone's
flashlight to slowly scan every surface, particularly suspicious areas. Look for a tiny glint or reflection, like a small
pinpoint of light. This could be a camera lens.

The Cell Phone Scan: There's an App for that

These apps use your phone's flashlight or infrared sensor to spot lenses from hidden cameras:

- Hidden Camera Detector (iOS & Android) Uses magnetic sensor and infrared lens detection. Also detects
 potential devices on the network.
- Glint Finder (Android) Uses the phone's flash to detect reflections from camera lenses. Best in dim lighting.
- Spy Camera Detector (iOS) Uses a similar technique of light reflection. Can also scan for infrared lights.

Network Scanning Apps

These apps scan local Wi-Fi networks to identify IP cameras and other connected devices:

- Fing (iOS & Android) Identifies all devices connected to a Wi-Fi network. Can help you spot unknown devices (e.g., hidden IP cameras).
- Network Scanner by First Row (Android) Helps locate suspicious cameras.
- iNet (iOS) Shows all devices on your network, including MAC addresses and vendor info.

RF and Magnetic Field Detection Apps

These apps detect electromagnetic fields that may indicate hidden electronics:

- Electromagnetic Detector EMF (Android) Detects EMF radiation from hidden devices.
- ElectroSmart (Android) Focuses on electromagnetic exposure, can alert to unusual activity.

What to Do If You Find a Hidden Camera:

Discovering a hidden camera can be deeply unsettling. Here's how to proceed:

- Do Not Touch or Disturb It: Preserve the scene as evidence.
- Contact Authorities: Call local law enforcement and follow their instructions.
- Inform Leadership: Unit Leader, Camp Director, and Scout Executive
- Document Everything: Make a report to ScoutsFirst.

While the thought of hidden cameras can be disturbing, staying informed and taking these proactive steps can empower you to protect our Scouts' privacy and security. Your vigilance is our best defense against unwanted intrusions.

What we Do in the Cornhusker Council

The Cornhusker Council has a hidden camera detector and routinely sweeps the buildings at Camp Cornhusker (pool house, cabins, latrines, bathrooms, etc.) before, during, and after camp, as well as the OEC (no, we've never found anything). There are several inexpensive detectors that are available on the market, some of which are small enough to fit in a suitcase or backpack. Do your research and consider procuring a device for your unit's use during outings, whether at a state park, hotel, etc.

CONGRATULATIONS TO EXPLORER POST 575



HOW IS YOUR TROOP DOING?





EARN THE CORNHUSKER COUNCIL'S 250TH ANNIVERSARY AWARD!

In honor of the United States' 250th anniversary, Cornhusker Council invites all youth and adult members to commemorate this historic milestone by earning a special Nebraska 250th Anniversary Patch. This program encourages Scouts to explore our state's history, recognize important figures, contribute to their communities, and reflect on Nebraska's place in the story of America.



Historical Background:

The United States will mark its Semiquincentennial in 2026, celebrating 250 years since the signing of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. Nebraska, while not one of the original thirteen colonies, played a critical role in the westward expansion of the U.S. and the shaping of the nation. From the Louisiana Purchase and the passage of the Homestead Act, to the legacy of leaders like Chief Standing Bear, Nebraska holds a unique place in America's journey toward liberty and justice for all.

To honor this milestone, this patch program combines historical learning with civic engagement, outdoor exploration, and service—true to the spirit of Scouting.

Program Details:

Eligibility:

Open to all registered youth and adult members of Cornhusker Council, Scouting America, including:

- Cub Scouts
- Scouts BSA
- Venturers
- Sea Scouts
- Adult Leaders

Timeframe:

All requirements must be completed and submitted by **December 31, 2026**.

Award Requirements:

To earn the **Nebraska 250th Anniversary Patch**, complete **all** of the following:

APPLY FOR THE VFW SCOUT OF THE YEAR AWARD

Annually, the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States recognizes individuals who are: Eagle Scouts, Girl Scout Gold Award recipients, Venture Summit Award recipients and/or Sea Scout Quartermasters who have risen above their peers in exemplifying the qualities of that rank.

To be eligible for the award, the candidate must:

- Be the recipient of the Eagle Scout Award, Girl Scout Gold Award, Venture Summit Award or Sea Scout Quartermaster Award.
- Be a registered, active member of a Boy or Girl Scout Troop, Venturing Crew or Sea Scout Ship at the time the above reward was received.
- Have demonstrated exemplary citizenship in school,

Scouting and community.

There is no minimum age requirement for applicants as long as all other eligibility criteria has been met. The maximum age requirement for applicants is 18 years old. If an applicant reaches their 18th birthday during the nomination year, they remain eligible as long as they are still in high school at the time of the submission deadline. A Scout may enter through only **one** VFW Post. A local Post can be identified by zip code at **vfw.org/FindaPost**.



Welcome to Cornhusker Council Wood Badge!

Wood Badge is an adult training where you work with others to learn and practice leadership skills (as a member of a successful working team) and live the values of scouting.



This course will help you understand the full values-based family of Scouting programs as well as discover ways to use the leadership skills to improve your personal and professional life.

Wood Badge gives leaders the skills they need to strengthen Scouting in meaningful ways and deliver a quality program to our youth.

Skills Useful Outside of Scouting

You will be able to use these lessons and experiences from Wood Badge outside of scouting to make every team a successful team, whether the team is at your work or is your family. Inspired in England by Lord Baden-Powell at Gilwell Camp, Wood Badge is today offered around the world. Upon completion, a Scouter receives a certificate, neckerchief, woggle, and beads, and becomes a permanent member of Troop 1, Gilwell.

Woodbadge Course Description

Wood Badge is advanced leadership training for adult leaders in all of Boy Scouting's program areas - Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting, Varsity Scouting, and Venturing - as well Council and District leaders. It teaches skills that are useful in Scouting, work, family, and other community service activities. The focus is on leadership and team-building, not outdoor skills.

Objectives of Wood Badge

To enable you to view Scouting globally, as a family of interrelated, values-based programs that provide age-appropriate activities

To help you recognize contemporary leadership concepts that applies to our values-based movement.

To apply the skills learned as a member of a successful working team.

To revitalize your commitment to Scouting by sharing in an overall inspirational experience.

Course Organization

The Wood Badge experience is divided into two parts - a practical phase and an application phase.

Practical Phase

The practical phase consists of Five days of instruction.

During this time you will become a member of a group, share skills and knowledge, become an effective team and have a great experience while doing it.

Themes covered in the practical phase include:

- Living the Values (developing your personal mission and vision)
- Bringing the Vision to Life (communication skills, coaching and mentoring, leveraging diversity)
- Models for Success (how your style of leadership should relate to the skills of your team)
- Tools of the Trade (project planning, managing conflict, assessing team performance, managing change, celebrating team success)
- Leading to Make a Difference (leaving a legacy and secrets of leadership)

With the help of a staffer, you will be able to develop a "ticket" by the end of the practical phase of the course. This is a set of 5 personal goals designed to significantly strengthen the program in which you are involved. The ticket provides a structure for the practice of the new skills you will learn.

Application Phase

The application phase is also known as "working your ticket". You will have 18 months to complete your ticket, which will allow you to become proficient in the leadership and team-building skills you have just learned. Upon completion of the Wood Badge ticket, as certified by a ticket counselor and the Scout Executive, you will be presented with the Wood Badge certificate, neckerchief, woggle, and beads at an appropriate public ceremony.

UNIFORM: A full, official uniform is required and consists of: official BSA uniform shirt; official BSA uniform pants, shorts or skirts- skirts or shorts are worn, official BSA socks are required; and official BSA web belt.

COUNCIL TRAINING UPDATE

As of August 5, 2025, 48.1% of the adult leaders in the Cornhusker Council are on record as having completed training for their specific position(s). 98.1% of the adults are current on their Youth Protection/Safeguarding Youth Training, but around 4% of those will expire in the next 90 days

All of our numbers are on an upward trend which is great to see! For the position specific training especially, we would like to see that number higher than 60%, and for Youth Protection/Safeguarding Youth Training that number should be 100%.

If you are part of the Key 3 for a unit, please make sure you are actively working with new and existing leaders in your unit to get them through the training for the positions they hold in the unit. Also, remember that direct

contact leaders, which would be Den Leaders, Cubmasters, Assistant Scoutmasters and Scoutmasters need to keep their Hazardous Weather Training current to be considered trained. The Hazardous Weather Training currently needs to be renewed every two years.
