Hourly Merit Badge Schedule

Merit badges are offered in at least one of the five one-hour sessions which meet Monday- Friday:

Session 1: 8:30 AM - 9:30 AM Session 4: 1:30 PM - 2:30 PM Session 2: 9:45 AM - 10:45 AM Session 5: 2:45 PM - 3:45 PM

Session 3: 11:00 AM - 12:00 PM

Sessions are one hour in length with 15 minutes provided between sessions so Scouts can get to their next activity on time. Some merit badges and activities span multiple sessions. As a result, someone signing up for C.O.P.E., Environmental Science Merit Badge, or Trail to First Class will need to be aware of the schedule.

Scoutmasters will be able to sign-up for merit badges and activities beginning no later than **February 9th, 2019**. Merit badges and other activities each have a maximum enrollment based on facility, equipment, and instruction limitations, so it is important that Scouts sign-up for the merit badges and activities they want to participate in as soon as possible.

This schedule will allow Scouts to complete their merit badges and receive fewer partials at the end of your week at Camp. We hope that you and your Scouts will benefit from this scheduling. For some merit badges, additional time may be needed to be spent observing, practicing, or involved in project work. It is imperative for each Scout to check-in to their merit badges to receive credit for the work they complete.

Swim Checks

In 1908, Lord Baden-Powell wrote, "Every boy should learn to swim, I've known lots of fellows pick it up the first try, others take longer..." An important aspect of advancement at camp is helping Scouts improve their swimming ability. At camp check-in, all Scouts will report to the pool to present physicals and for the swim check. The swimming ability of all Scouts and leaders must be evaluated before they can take part in any aquatics activity, per BSA policy. There are three classifications (tags) of swimming skills: non-swimmer (white), beginner (red), and swimmer (blue). All Scouts must have a swim tag.

The check consists of:

- 1. Jump feet first into water over your head in depth.
- 2. Swim 75 yards or meters in a strong manner using one or more of the following strokes: sidestroke, breaststroke, trudgen, or crawl.
- 3. Then swim 25 yards or 25 meters using an easy, resting backstroke.
- **4.** The 100 yards or 100 meters must be swum continuously and include at least one sharp turn.
- 5. After completing the swim, rest by floating as motionless as possible.

Scouts and Scouters fulfilling all the above requirements receive a blue swimmer tag. Scouts and Scouters who can only jump in water over their head, swim 50 feet, and make one sharp turn receive a red beginner tag. Scouts and Scouters who cannot complete the beginner requirements, or Scouts who choose not to swim, will receive a white tag.

Schedule Information

Weather Impact on Program/Activities

Occasionally, camp program and activities will be impacted by weather events. In particular the Aquatics, C.O.P.E., Climbing and Shooting Sports areas are often first impacted. Thunder and lightning in the vicinity of camp can cause us to "delay" or "cancel" these activities. We do not take camper safety lightly! Decisions made to close an area are determined by the Area Director in consultation with the Camp Administration.

Trail To First Class

Trail To First Class Trail To First Class (TTFC) is a premier program for first year Scouts. The Camp Cornhusker program is renowned across the Midwest as a premier program for first year Scouts. This first year, hands on program, gives the scouts the best foundation for their Scouting future.

The Camp Cornhusker Trail to First Class is a great program for your first year Scout. From Troop meetings to patrol meetings, led by trained adult leaders, this class teaches the meanings of the Scout Oath and Law. The scouts will learn to use a knife, hatchet, saw to make tinder and kindling, so they can start the fire with flint and steel. Scouts will, also, learn their knots and how to build a useful camp gadget with lashings. Leaders will show scouts how to use a compass and go on both a day and night compass courses. They also can participate in a five-mile nature hike if they wish to complete that requirement at camp. They will learn how to tell directions with a watch and to put a stick in the ground. This is a hands on experience and the scouts will be busy doing and learning.

We cover most of the requirements for Second and First Class. If scouts would like the swimming and first aid requirements completed they are welcome to take those merit badges in the afternoon. We will, also, be offering scheduled time during the week for scouts not taking those merit badges to partake in the training for those requirements only needed for First Class.

Order of the Arrow

The Order of the Arrow is Scouting's national honor society, built around the lore of the Native Americans, the ideal of Scouting brotherhood, cheerful service to others, and the outdoors. Its purpose is to recognize those Scouts and Scouters that exemplify the Scout Oath and Law.

Membership requirements include:

- 1. Unit Leader Approval.
- 2. Within the last two years, experience 15 days and nights of camping according to the standards of the Boy Scouts of America, five of which must be consecutive nights under the guidance of the Boy Scouts of America.
- 3. Be a First Class Scout or above and be elected by the youth of his troop.
- 4. A Lodge Election Team must conduct Unit Elections. For more information, you may contact your local council's lodge.

An OA Call-Out Ceremony will be every Thursday night beginning at 8:30 PM in the council fire ring. Be sure to bring and wear your sash!

**NOTE: Please Complete your Unit Election prior to camp and turn the election form in to your OA Representative. Please bring your copy of the election form to camp as well.

Camp Cornhusker Check In Process

- 1. <u>Check In Time:</u> The Troop should report to camp as a group no earlier than 1:30 PM and no later than 3:30 PM. Check in procedure ends at 3:30 PM.
- 2. <u>Camp Office:</u> A temporary office will be set up in the Korff Building on check in day. The Camp Director and Health Officer need these items from the Scoutmaster:
 - A. Troop Roster
 - B. All receipts for camp fees paid at the Council Office
 - C. Money or check to complete any fee payments due
 - D. Out of Council Troops-Tour Plan and Proof of Accident Insurance
- 3. <u>Medical Check:</u> All medical forms will be collected at this time by the camp Health Officer (if not turned in at Early Check In in May). All medications will be locked up by troop in a lock box by the Health Lodge. Leaders will be responsible for the distribution of their troops' medications, not the camp Health Officer.
- 4. <u>Campsite:</u> Once the troop has completed the initial check in process, campers should go to their campsite, unload gear and set up ONE tent. They should then change in to their swim wear and then go to the Dining Hall. Each scout and adult leader needs to wear swim wear and shoes.
- 5. **Dining Hall Orientation:** All campers must attend this brief overview of the Dining Hall procedures. The orientation is in the Dining Hall on a continuing basis until 4:30 PM.
- 6. Swim Check: Immediately Following the Dining Hall orientation, your troop should report to the pool for the standard BSA swim check. The swim check is administered by a certified BSA Lifeguard. Swim checks completed prior to camp need to have the form presented to the aquatics staff so they can make your appropriate buddy tag. The Aquatics Director retains the right to retest any swimmer if he/she feels it is necessary.
- 7. <u>Campsite Set Up:</u> Following swim checks and a tour of camp, your troop will return to your campsite to finish getting settled.
- 8. <u>Leader's Meeting:</u> One leader from each troop is REQUIRED to attend this meeting to discuss camp policies and procedures. The meeting begins at **4:30 PM** in the Korff Building. This meeting will begin promptly at 4:30 PM.
- 9. Flag Ceremony: The entire camp assembles for flag retreat at 6:00 PM. All scouts should be in uniform. Be sure to have your entire troop on the Parade Grounds before 6:10 PM (Flag ceremony starts at 6:15 PM).
- 10. Dinner: Beings immediately following the flag ceremony at 6:15 PM.

Camp Equipment and What to Bring to Camp

Need to Have

- Scout uniform
- Clothing for 7 days and 6 nights including...underwear, socks, shirts, long pants, shorts, sweater/jacket, swim trunks, appropriate shoes
- Bring an extra pair of old beat up shoes for messy kicking around Camp
- Toilet kit containing: washcloths, towels, comb, toothpaste, toothbrush, soap, deodorant
- Insect repellent
- Sleeping bag or blankets and pillow
- · Cot and ground cloth
- Rain gear or poncho
- Canteen or water bottle
- Wallet and money
- Scout handbook
- Merit badge pamphlets
- Pen, pencil and notebook
- Current medical form
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Two garbage bags

Trail to First Class participants and adults attending IOLS need

- Compass
- Pocketknife
- Watch
- Plate, Cup, Knife, Fork and Spoon
- Bible, Testament or Prayer Book

Label all clothing and equipment with Boy Scout's name and Troop number.

Unit Equipment

All equipment necessary for cooking both for the Dutch Oven Cook Off and the Cooking in Campsite for Thursday dinner.

Campsite Equipment

Each troop's campsite includes a flag pole, fire pit, carport style shelter, water hydrant.

CAMP CORNHUSKER EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

In the event of an actual emergency, the following procedures will be enforced: The Camp Director is in charge of all Emergency Action. In the event the Camp Director is not available, his/her designee is in charge.

1. **LIGHTNING** (NO AUDIO SIGNAL)

PROCEDURE - Outdoor activities will be postponed if thunderstorms are imminent. Do not take shelter in small sheds, campsite shelters or under isolated trees. If caught outdoors, find a low spot away from trees, flag poles, telephone poles and power lines. Make sure the place you pick is not subject to flooding. If you are in the woods, take shelter under the shorter trees. If you feel your skin tingle or your hair stand on end, squat low to the ground on the balls of your feet. Place your hands over your ears and your head between your knees. Make yourself the smallest target possible and minimize your contact with the ground. DO NOT lie down. If you are boating or swimming, get to land and follow the guidelines above. The person in charge will give an all clear when the threat has past. HOW FAR AWAY IS THE THUNDERSTORM? Count the number of seconds between a flash of lightning and the next clap of thunder. Divide this number by 5 to determine the distance to the lightning in miles.

2. TORNADO/WINDSTORM/SEVERE WEATHER

AUDIO SIGNAL - Continuous blowing of the Camp siren.

PROCEDURE – Camp Management will regularly inform Camp Leaders of Watches issued in the area. Method of this communication will vary based on the time of day. During exploration tour of Camp, each unit will be instructed on where their designated low lying area is. Scout Leaders are instructed to brief there Scouts on how to prepare for this type of emergency upon arrival in Camp. During Monday program sessions, Scouts will be instructed by the counselors on where the designated low lying areas are near the program areas.

When there is an actual Warning, the siren will sound a continuous blow. When this is heard, all Campers will move to designated low areas away from trees. Lie flat in a nearby ditch or depression and cover your head with your hands and sleeping bag if possible. Be aware of flying debris.


After all danger has passed, a Staff member will be dispatched to work with Unit Leaders to make sure everyone is accounted for. Do not leave your designated low area until you are notified by Staff.

3. **FIRE**

AUDIO SIGNAL - Continuous ringing of the Camp bell.

PROCEDURE - When the bell is heard all Campers are to report to the flagpole located on the parade ground on the west side of the Dining Hall. Scoutmasters will take a roll call. They will report to the person in charge. In the event the fire is confined to a campsite, follow the fireguard plan immediately and inform the Camp Staff. Good fire practices will eliminate this problem.

- 4. **EXTREME HEAT** PROCEDURE In the event the temperature and/or humidity reaches an extreme level that may endanger health, all events will be discontinued until further notice. The person in charge will determine if the emergency exists. Campers will be expected to rest during this period. The pool will be open on a limited basis to cool off in. The all clear signal will come from the person in charge.
- 5. **MAJOR HEALTH EMERGENCIES** PROCEDURE- All accidents and illness must be reported to the person in charge or the Health Officer immediately. In the event the victim cannot be moved, send someone to find help immediately and locate the person in charge or the Health Officer. *The Camp Director is the only spokesman in this event.* The person in charge or Health Officer decides if an accident or illness will require hospital treatment.
- 6. **FLOOD, EARTHQUAKES & CHEMICAL SPILLS** PROCEDURE All Campers will report to the Dining Hall area when the Camp Staff sounds the warning. Roll call will be taken. After everyone is accounted for the person in charge will direct procedures or evacuation to a safer area.
- 7. **MISSING PERSON** PROCEDURE All available Camp Staff and Adult Leadership will be assembled at the Camp Office. The person in charge will institute search procedures. After a reasonable length of time has passed and the missing person(s) still has not been found, the person in charge will notify the proper authorities.
- 8. **CHILD ABUSE** PROCEDURE Any child abuse or suspected child abuse must be reported immediately to the Scout Executive. Contact the Camp Director or person in charge for assistance in contacting the Scout Executive or his designee. The immediate health and safety of the individual(s) will be considered during any course of action taken. The National BSA policies for two deep Unit/campsite leadership and Youth Protection guidelines will be followed.

Cornhusker Lip Sync Battle Rules

- 1. Registration for the Lip Sync battle will occur during the Monday Senior Patrol Leader meeting.

- 5. Maximum time limit for your performance or song will be limited to no more than 4 minutes in length. Please understand that we are under a time limit. It is only fair to all that we use the same time limit. It is okay if your song is less than 4 minutes, but if it is longer, at the 4 minute mark all music will be faded out.
- 6. ALL SONGS AND PERFORMANCES MUST BE SCOUT APPROPRIATE. This is a scouting event for all ages of Boy Scouts. Any performance done in poor taste will be interrupted and the act will be disqualified. Only songs provided on the list will be allowed.
- 7. Boy Scout code of conduct will be expected of all participants. Please follow the Boy Scout Oath and Law and behave as a Boy Scout should. This includes but is not limited to respecting the camp staff, respecting fellow performers, respecting audience members and being COURTEOUS to our fellow Scouts.

The competition will be judged in these categories:

- A. Lip Sync Abilities: How well the performers lip-sync the lyrics of the song.
- B. Creativity: How original and creative the performance is. Instead of just standing on stage and lip-syncing a song props, choreography, costumes and/or other ideas should be used. These will impress the judges and generates crowd response. Be Creative!
- C. Stage Presence and Choreography: Again, don't just stand there! Engage the audience, dance, smile, make eye contact with the judges...you're a STAR...have fun!!!

Each category will be worth 30 points each. In case of a tie, the act with the highest "Lip Sync Abilities" score will win. The judges decisions will be final! The top three acts will perform during the Friday night campfire and the winner will be announced at that time
