#### I DON'T WANT TO BURY ONE OF MY SCOUTS - by Trev Peterson

Zero/Zero. Zero cases of abuse and zero preventable accidents. That's the goal of the Council and its Risk Management Committee. The Risk Management Committee was reconstituted this summer with the goal of reviewing the Council's policies and procedures and updating those policies and procedures. The committee is also acting as a clearing house to provide information and suggestion to all units in Cornhusker Council. Safety of our scouts is the primary responsibility of every Scouter, every adult, every volunteer and every Scout in every unit. While many of you agree with that, for many units, safety gets ignored or shunted to the back of the priority list. Our goal is to get every unit to focus attention of its adults and Scouts on safety. Safety is Job One for Everyone.

Where to start? Safety is a big job for our units. Units have to resist the two objections to safety policies.

- "It can't happen here." Ask the parents of the kids killed at the flash flood in Texas, or the family of the lady killed by the falling tree at Two Rivers State Park during the August 9<sup>th</sup> windstorm. Dangerous weather can happen here. Your unit needs to "Be Prepared."
- 2. The second objection is "having a policy will scare our Scouts." That notion is clearly wrong. Public schools have fire drills and active shooter drills. Your Scouts are familiar with those drills and if your unit emphasizes that the drills are for everyone's safety, then the "scare the Scouts" objection can be mitigated. For Cub Scouts, you can work the unit safety procedures into a discussion on what the Cubs can do to protect themselves and their family at home. For older Scouts the "scare our Scouts" issue is less of a concern. If you ask the Scouts (a novel concept), they may actually feel that knowing what to do reduces their fear.

I'm selfish. I don't want to bury a Scout because my troop did not address an unsafe condition or unsafe activity, did not have a plan or did not share the plan with my Scouts. I want my Scouts to focus on safety and, since our troops are supposed to be "Scout led," Scouts should be encouraged to remind the adults to review, modify and implement changes to the unit's safety policies. For Cub Scouts, you may not get much feedback, but consider asking the Cubs for comments or feedback on the policies—you might be surprised.

<u>So, where to start</u>? Let's start with safety issues at your unit's meeting place. Does your unit have a <u>policy</u> for fire at your meeting place? Is the policy in writing? Where is the policy physically located? When was the policy last reviewed? How is the policy communicated to your Scouts? Do you practice the fire policy so every Scout knows what to do and more importantly what not to do?

What about tornado/hazardous weather during a unit's meeting? Same set of questions. Do your Scouts know what to do? What about an active shooter? Have you even considered having an active shooter policy?

What should a policy look like? Start by reviewing the safety policies, if any, that are in place at your meeting location. The church, school or meeting hall may already have a written policy that your unit could adopt or adopt the plan as modified for your unit's needs.

Once your unit has addressed the meeting place risks, move to what to do on a unit outing. For troops, the issue is what to do at campout, what is your unit to do if there's a wild fire, hazardous weather or an active shooter? Here's a good opportunity to put the written policy in with the medical forms, or the other folder of documents you take with you to campouts. While having the policy with the unit is important, reviewing the policy with the scouts is critical for their safety. For Cub Scout units, in addition to considering what to do on campouts, what are you to do if the Cub Scout unit is at some other event. What do you do if you are visiting a library? What do you do if you're at a pack picnic or bike rodeo?

As we move forward, the Risk Management Committee plans to provide access to information on what to do and who to call in cases of abuse or accidents or other reportable incidents, including links to the forms to complete for each incident. We will provide periodic updates at Roundtables and on the Council's website, if possible.

Parents of our Scouts expect us to provide a safe environment for their children. Adults associated with the program are concerned about safety, but we tend to focus on the program, our "to do list" and don't necessarily move safety to a top concern. Consider troops camping during the fall through to early spring. It's generally dark when camp is set up. How many of us take a few minutes on Saturday morning to walk the camp to be sure that tents are not set up under trees with dead branches? Are the tents set up too close to a creek or too close to a lake? If your unit has a written plan for activities on campouts, put a few minutes in before or after your flag ceremony to have an adult, the SPL and troop quartermaster or patrol leaders walk the camp to be sure it's safe. If not, move tents as needed to protect the scouts. Remember, it can happen here.

# COMBATTING ONLINE EXPLOITATION TRAINING, OCT 15TH AT THE OEC

Online child sexual exploitation and abuse (CSEA) is a horrific crime that targets some of the most vulnerable people in our communities – our children and teens. It includes a broad range of criminal acts that involve exploiting minors for sexual gratification or some other personal or financial gain.



Scouting America has partnered with the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and Know2Protect, a first-of-its-kind national public awareness campaign about the risks children face in the online environment, providing Scouts and their families with the knowledge and skills they need to protect themselves and their families online.

The Cornhusker Council, in partnership with Homeland Security Investigations, is hosting Project iGuardian, a training and education session for our Scouts and their families to help better protect our youth.

Project iGuardian offers presentations designed to inform children, teens, parents and trusted adults on the threat of online child sexual exploitation and abuse (CSEA), how to implement preventive strategies and how to report suspected abuse to law enforcement. Project iGuardian features Homeland Security Investigation's case studies and investigative knowledge coupled with perspectives from victim assistance and forensic interview specialists.

## MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID, OCT 25

Mental Health First Aid is an international evidence-based education program proven to be effective in teaching adults how to recognize and respond to signs and symptoms of mental health and substance use challenges. Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA) is designed to teach parents, family members, caregivers, teachers, school staff, peers, neighbors, health and human services workers, and other caring citizens how to help an adolescent (age 12-18) who is experiencing a mental health or substance use challenge or is in crisis.



Youth Mental Health First Aid is primarily designed for adults who regularly interact with young people. The course introduces common mental health challenges for youth, reviews typical adolescent development, and teaches a 5-step action plan for how to help young people in both crisis

and non-crisis situations. Topics covered include anxiety, depression, substance use, disorders in which psychosis may occur, disruptive behavior disorders (including ADHD), and eating disorders.





Welcome to Cornhusker Council Wood Badge!

Wood Badge is an adult training where you work with others to learn and practice leadership skills (as a member of a successful working team) and live the values of scouting.



This course will help you understand the full values-based family of Scouting programs as well as discover ways to use the leadership skills to improve your personal and professional life.

Wood Badge gives leaders the skills they need to strengthen Scouting in meaningful ways and deliver a quality program to our youth.

#### Skills Useful Outside of Scouting

You will be able to use these lessons and experiences from Wood Badge outside of scouting to make every team a successful team, whether the team is at your work or is your family. Inspired in England by Lord Baden-Powell at Gilwell Camp, Wood Badge is today offered around the world. Upon completion, a Scouter receives a certificate, neckerchief, woggle, and beads, and becomes a permanent member of Troop 1, Gilwell.

#### **Woodbadge Course Description**

Wood Badge is advanced leadership training for adult leaders in all of Boy Scouting's program areas - Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting, Varsity Scouting, and Venturing - as well Council and District leaders. It teaches skills that are useful in Scouting, work, family, and other community service activities. The focus is on leadership and team-building, not outdoor skills.

#### **Objectives of Wood Badge**

To enable you to view Scouting globally, as a family of interrelated, values-based programs that provide age-appropriate activities

To help you recognize contemporary leadership concepts that applies to our values-based movement.

To apply the skills learned as a member of a successful working team.

To revitalize your commitment to Scouting by sharing in an overall inspirational experience.

#### **Course Organization**

The Wood Badge experience is divided into two parts - a practical phase and an application phase.

#### **Practical Phase**

The practical phase consists of Five days of instruction.

During this time you will become a member of a group, share skills and knowledge, become an effective team and have a great experience while doing it.

Themes covered in the practical phase include:

- Living the Values (developing your personal mission and vision)
- Bringing the Vision to Life (communication skills, coaching and mentoring, leveraging diversity)
- Models for Success (how your style of leadership should relate to the skills of your team)
- Tools of the Trade (project planning, managing conflict, assessing team performance, managing change, celebrating team success)
- Leading to Make a Difference (leaving a legacy and secrets of leadership)

With the help of a staffer, you will be able to develop a "ticket" by the end of the practical phase of the course. This is a set of 5 personal goals designed to significantly strengthen the program in which you are involved. The ticket provides a structure for the practice of the new skills you will learn.

### **Application Phase**

The application phase is also known as "working your ticket". You will have 18 months to complete your ticket, which will allow you to become proficient in the leadership and team-building skills you have just learned. Upon completion of the Wood Badge ticket, as certified by a ticket counselor and the Scout Executive, you will be presented with the Wood Badge certificate, neckerchief, woggle, and beads at an appropriate public ceremony.

UNIFORM: A full, official uniform is required and consists of: official BSA uniform shirt; official BSA uniform pants, shorts or skirts- skirts or shorts are worn, official BSA socks are required; and official BSA web belt.

Jamboree-on-the-Internet, or JOTI, is an annual international Sc outing event sponsored by the World Organization of the Scout Movement. Each year, during the third weekend in October, Scouts from around the world gather online to learn about other cultures and the activities in which other Scouts participate. They communicate with each other using Internet-enabled devices such as computers, laptops, tablets, and mobile phones. Each year, JOTI has nearly 16,000 Scouts and leaders from over 145 countries registered in the worldwide JOTA-JOTI database! Who Can Participate? Scouts of any age can take part, from Cub Scouts to

Scouts BSA and Venturers. Scouts can participate at home with the help of an adult, or they can participate in a Scout group at a council event. JOTI is an economical way to participate in an international jamboree. The event allows Scouts to "meet" other Scouts from around the world through the Internet and share more information than just "Hi." The exchanges can include such information as name, location of event, Scout rank, age, and hobbies. Some exchanges lead to long-lasting friendships. JOTI participation fulfills requirements for Tiger and Arrow of Light adventures, the Citizenship in the World merit badge, and the International Spirit Award. Jamboree-on-the-Air, or JOTA, is the largest Scouting event in the world. It is held annually during the third full weekend in October. JOTA uses amateur radio to link Scouts and Radio operators around the world, around the nation, and in your own community. This jamboree requires no travel, other than to a nearby amateur radio operator's ham shack. It's a great way to get more youth interested in amateur radio while demonstrating the fun as well as the service aspects via emergency communication of amateur radio. The scope of your JOTA activities is only limited by your imagination Tell Me More Scouts of any age can participate: from Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA and Venturers, up to BSA Adult Leaders. Any amateur mode of operation can be used such, as CW, SSB, PSK, SSTV, FM, and satellite. The more modes in operation, the more exciting the event will be for the Scouts. JOTA is not a contest. The idea is to contact other Scout stations and allow as many Scouts as possible to talk to other Scouts and learn about who they are and what they are doing. The exchanges include such information as name, location (called QTH in ham speak), Scout rank, age, and hobbies. The stations you'll be communicating with can be across town, across the country, or even around the world! The World Scout Bureau reported that nearly over 1 million Scouts and around 20,000 amateur radio operators participate in JOTA annually, from more than 17,000 stations in over 150 countries. # DONALD MCPHERSON, WWII AND SCOUTING VETERAN (1922-2025)

We were saddened to learn that Donald McPherson passed away last month at the age of 103. Donald was a Navy pilot during WW II and was the nation's last surviving WWII "fighter ace" from WW II. He was born in Adams, NE and returned to Adams after the war, where he joined Scouting in 1958 as an adult leader. Donald held many positions in Scouting over the years, to include Cubmaster of Pack 280, Scoutmaster of Troop 280, and numerous District and Council positions such as, Unit Commissioner and District Chairman. He earned the District Award of Merit and was awarded the Silver Beaver in 1974. #### WELCOME BACK TO SCHOOL-AND BACK TO SCOUTING!

First off, let me extend my sincerest thanks to every Scouter, parent, and Scout who invested time and energy into helping grow the Scouting Movement in southeast Nebraska and welcoming new youth and families into Scouting. From school talks and sign-up nights to one-on-one conversations with families, your dedication has brought the values of Scouting to more young people than ever. The strength of our program rests on your enthusiasm and commitment.



Celebrating Growth - Because of your efforts, more boys and girls now have the opportunity to experience adventure, leadership, and service. Each new Scout represents a new journey of growth, and it is your persistence in sharing Scouting's story that makes this possible. Over the next year, we will add a "Bring a Friend"/"Normal Friend Activity" component to our District and Council events to provide Units additional opportunities to grow the Scouting Movement. I encourage units to look for "BAF/NFA" opportunities throughout your program year. Our youth and our communities need Scouting more than ever! Always be recruiting!

**Commitment to Youth Safety** - Safeguarding Youth is our #1 priority. Recruitment is only part of our success. Just as important is our shared responsibility to keep every youth safe. Our council continues to lead with strong safeguarding programs, including:

- Youth Protection Training required for all leaders.
- o Two-deep leadership ensuring no adult is ever alone with youth.
- o Background checks and screening for all registered leaders.
- o **Ongoing education** for parents, leaders, and Scouts themselves on safe practices.

We have several Safeguarding Youth education programs over the coming months. First, be sure to pick up your Safeguarding Youth reference cards at Roundtable. Each unit will receive 3-4 reference cards. Put them in your program "kit bag" for ready reference. Second, be sure to check out the combatting online child sexual exploitation and abuse (CSEA) course on Oct 15th at the OEC. This seminar is provided by the Department of Homeland Security in partnership with Scouting America and is geared for youth and parents. Finally, we are hosting another Youth Mental Health First Aid training course on Oct 25th at the OEC (adults only). This course was well received by the participants who attended last year.

**Looking Ahead -** We have several exciting District and Council activities planned this fall! District Camporees, Cub Scout Day of Awesomeness, adult leader training, and more! Noteworthy is the "Trail to Troops" (formerly known as WEBLOS Woods) event on Oct 18-19. This program has proven critical in the continuation of Arrow of Light Scouts into Scouts BSA.

The foundation you have built through recruitment and safety allows our program to thrive. Together, we are not only growing Scouting but ensuring it remains a safe, welcoming place where youth can develop character and leadership. Thank you for the countless hours you give and the example you set. Because of you, Scouting continues to shape the lives of young people in our communities.
